Auto-repair firm moves to Valley
SCOTTSDALE — An auto-repair franchisor that plans to expand nationally has established its headquarters in the Scottsdale Airpark.
Honest-1 Auto Care LLC opened its main office and a service center at 7430 E. Butherus Drive, Suite B. The company has 19 franchises in 10 states and says it plans to double the number of locations in a year.
Chief executive officer Jack Keilt said the firm chose Scottsdale because of the other national franchisors in the area, which offers Honest-1 a vendor base and an experienced workforce. He also cited the city's eco-friendly business practices.
Honest-1 is a full-service auto-repair and maintenance chain that encourages recycling of auto materials, preventing pollution and conserving resources.
The firm has nine employees in Scottsdale and annual revenue of \$11 million.
The management team includes Keilt, a former CEO of Fantastic Sams hair salon chain; chairman Gary Messer, president of Arizona Auto Lenders Auto Financing; senior vice president of operations Rissy Sutherland, formerly with auto-repair franchisor Moran Industries Inc.; and vice president of franchise development Tim McCarthy, formerly with the Cold Stone Creamery chain.

Auto-repair firm moves to Valley
